Answer: Double

Promising four hearts and 6+ HCP. Note that the double does not guarantee four cards in the other unbid suit, clubs. If West rebids 2. East will put West back into diamonds.

Answer: 1NT

You have a balanced hand and a good spade stop.

Answer: Double

Promising four spades and 6+ HCP. With a fifth spade East would have bid 1♠

Answer: 1♠

Promising 5+ spades and 6+ HCP. With only four spades East would have bid 1♠

Answer: Pass

Let North play in $1 \triangleq$ and hope to defeat the contract. In practice south will almost certainly bid something

Answer: 2♥

You are too strong to make a negative double, which would indicate 6-8 HCP.

Answer: Double

The double here shows spades but does not guarantee the unbid minor. If West rebids clubs then South will bid $2 \spadesuit$.

Answer: Double

6+ HCP and four cards in each major. The double could be made with a much stronger hand and no 5 card major

Answer: Double

You may think that you can bid 1♥ and if partner has four spades she will bid them so the spade fit won't be missed, but that assumes that South remains silent. If South bids 2♦ partner may not be strong enough to bid 2♠ and a spade fit could be missed

Answer: Double

You are showing both minors and 6-8 HCP. You are too weak to bid an unlimited 2♥ as you don't satisfy the Rule of 14.

Answer: Double

Partner will think you are showing both minors and 6-8 HCP. You correct this misinterpretation when you rebid your diamonds. Partner will know you have a hand with long diamonds and too weak to bid a direct 2 •

Answer: Double

You have the perfect hand for a negative double

Answer: 2♥

You do not have the unbid major so cannot double, and you are too weak to bid your diamonds.

Answer: Double

You are not strong enough to bid diamonds and then spades. For that you would need 11+ HCP. You have four cards in the unbid suit, spades but If partner is not interested in spades and rebids her hearts you should bid 3♦

Answer: 2♦

You have enough strength for game. You can show your spades on the next round.

Answer: Double

With just 8 HCP You are not quite strong enough to bid $2 \spadesuit$ (bidding over partner's $2 \heartsuit$ barrier shows 11+ HCP) and then $3 \spadesuit$. By using the negative double and then bidding spades you show long spades and a weaker hand.
